




Letter from the President June DeWeese

provided lunch during finals week for students from the college-age ministry group. The students enjoyed a great meal with left-overs to take home. Students who were unable to attend at the lunch time, had meals packaged to pick up and enjoy later in the day.

On May 18th, Searcy-Feely members were presented with a program on the resettlement of the two families from Afghanistan sponsored by MUMC who have become part of the Columbia community. Caryl Bryan and Melissa Clarke explained the lengthy process of applying for and preparing for the families. Melissa explained that the term used is "evacuees" rather than "refugees" because the families and individuals

had been evacuated for their safety because of their work for the United States. The team put together from MUMC worked closely with and under the



supervision of **Catholic Charities of Central and Northern Missouri** because of the sanction of that organization by the US State Department as a recognized resettlement agency.

We not only learned about the process of the resettlement project, but also the *magnitude* of the preparation and follow-up provided by the numerous volunteers within the church in capacities such as education, medical needs, social needs, transportation, and financial guidance.

The goal of the project is to help the families to eventually live totally independently. Caryl reported that thanks to the generous donations from the MUMC congregation, two homes were secured and completely furnished. As a further means of support, members of Searcy-Feely purchased gift cards from Joann Fabrics and Crafts to provide a means of the easy purchase of material and sewing notions for the families. Because of the generous donations from circle members, Razmina and Nazifa were presented with gift cards to Joann's totaling \$175.00 apiece.

The circle is grateful to **Caryl Bryan** who has served as interim chair from January-May. After we return from summer break, **Paula Richards** will assume the position of interim chair for the remainder of the year. Our next meeting will be **Wednesday, September 21st.**

# Wesley Circle

On April 14th Wesley Circle met in The Parlor. Carole Adams introduced her friend, Lisa Acton, who shared the story of her diagnosis and treatments after being diagnosed with breast cancer. Lisa learned of a therapy called **Cold Capping** that reduces hair loss by 50 - 80%. Although insurance does not cover the \$3000 cost, Lisa decided to make the additional expenditure. She continued working at Wilson's during her chemo treatments and was able to keep about 50% of her hair. After her treatments and subsequent surgeries Lisa is fully recovered. She's especially excited and grateful that **Wilson's** purchased 2 sets of the reusable Cold Caps for people in the community to use, free of charge. There is an application process and Lisa will instruct women on how to use them. She encourages all women to advocate for themselves after a cancer diagnosis and work with the medical providers to make informed choices that work best for the individual.

Wesley Circle member, Debbie Schulte, also a breast cancer survivor, shared her experiences. She faced the additional challenge of having chemotherapy and surgeries during the worst of Covid-19. Her husband and other family members could not join her as she received her chemotherapy and were limited in visiting her during her hospital stay. Both women expressed gratitude for their recovery and answered the numerous questions members asked. One member even brought her 100 year old mother-in-law, who wanted information because she has a family member currently diagnosed with breast cancer



An Invitation



#### **Social Action**

There is so much going on in our country todayissues that have direct and powerful influence on the
lives of many people. The Supreme Court's decision
to overturn Roe vs Wade is just one of them.
Because there are so many reasons for having an
abortion, as well as for not having one, it becomes
very complicated to decide how one feels about the
issue. Louise Penny, author of the Gamache
mysteries, shared in her July newsletter some
ideas which might simplify things as we try to
understand the issue better. I am paraphrasing
below:

The right to choose is not pro-abortion. It is pro-choice. Including choosing not to abort. Choosing to use birth control. Choosing to abstain. Choosing adoption. (End of paraphrase)

All of you have heard the stories of women who had to choose aborting their fetuses. Heart breaking! Life or death! Complicated! I believe the decision belongs to the women and their doctors and support groups. Not to the government. Not to faith groups. Not to other people, no matter how well-meaning. Of course, reproductive rights are a controversial issue and some of you will disagree with what I have

written. It is my hope that we can disagree while respecting each other's feelings. No matter what one's opinions and feelings are, we often feel overwhelmed with thoughts of "what can I do to make a difference?" Perhaps the source of most of our power is the ballot box. Elections are drawing near. Can you drive someone to the



voting place? Can you help someone register to vote? Can you urge others to get out and vote? Most important - make sure you vote to support candidates who have pledged themselves to make decisions that reflect your feelings and beliefs. Thank you, **UWF Sisters!**
