Climate Justice for All is one of UMW's areas of emphasis this quadrennium. It's a bit overwhelming to think that we can make any difference in dealing with

this problem. However,

UMW has created "13 Steps to Sustainability" which includes some very simple, practical suggestions that we might consider in our unit and in our homes.



- 1. Reduce Carbon Footprint - Minimize travel to meetings by carpooling, using public transport or church buses.
- 2. Just Economic Opportunities Deal with vendors, businesses, etc. whom you know to be using no child or slave labor and no human trafficking and who treat their employees fairly.
- 3. Paper Usage When preparing printed handouts, print on both sides of paper made with post-consumer recycled content.
- 4. Toxin Reduction Reuse name tags; Encourage people to bring their own; Avoid using plastic holders or pouches.
- **5.** Waste Reduction Recycle plastic, paper, glass, metal
- **6.** Water Usage No bottled water; Use pitchers and glasses; BYO water.



Not all of their ideas are this simple. If you would like to know more about the "13 Steps" or "Climate Justice for All", Google "United Methodist Women/Climate Justice". Let's all strive to "choose life" so that we and our descendants may live.

Many of you have volunteered at The Wardrobe on the fourth Wednesday of the month, which is MUMC's designated day to volunteer. This article is to give you a little history about The Wardrobe and to tell you what our purpose is.

The Wardrobe was started by a group of women who saw there was a need in the community. Their goal was to furnish good used clothing free of charge for indigent families from Boone County and to provide 3 outfits of new clothing for school children (jeans, underwear, socks) and new shoes. They wanted to be self-supporting with no funding from any outside agency. They began taking donations of clothing on December 14, 1969. The Wardrobe opened its doors January 6, 1970 at 223 N. Ninth St.

Mondays were set aside for sorting, pricing, hanging and cleaning. Tuesdays were for Referral Days when clients would be afforded some privacy and served with dignity. Wednesday through Saturday were sales days to be manned by volunteers from church groups.

The Wardrobe soon outgrew its space at 223 N. Ninth St. and in August of 1970 they moved to 222 N. Ninth St. They stayed in this building until September 1983 when the building was torn down and the shop was closed for one year. The Wardrobe reopened in October 1984 at our current location, 715 Park Ave. The city leases the land to us for \$1.00/month. Thanks to many donations of money and services, The Wardrobe opened as a debt free building.

Not much has changed in the last 50 years. We still provide free clothing to clients on Tuesdays. We don't give 3 new outfits to school children (Upscale Resale does this), but we do still have our shoe coupon program. Guardians can buy a shoe coupon for a child for \$5.00 and take the coupon to Shoe Carnival to buy a pair of shoes valued up to \$40.00. This is for Boone County school age children only. One shoe coupon per child can be purchased every six months. The proceeds from our sales of donated items is what is used to pay Shoe Carnival the \$35.00 per shoe coupon.

We are still an all volunteer organization. Volunteers from 17 different churches help staff The Wardrobe. With Covid, we have had to cut down on the number of days we are open for sales, but our customers are still coming in and our sales figures have remained almost the same as when we were open more days. Two years ago we became involved with CoMoGives and that, along with applying for Grants has helped to supplement our income.
